Kleintierklinik

- Attended morning rounds (in German)

 - watching appointments
 - Thoracocentesis
- Rest of the time observing surgeries
 - Perineal hernia repair
 - Arthroscopic joint repair
 - Many others



Pferdeklinik

- Observed ongoing procedures
 - Colic surgery recovery
 - Club foot foal being shod
 - Shipping fever
- Sat in on a lecture (in German)
 - Equine diarrhea
 - Lameness
 - Colic











Clinical Differences

- They don't use syringes to draw blood
- Not very many spays & neuters
- Not as many apparent rotations in the hospital
- Not as many clinicians per student
- Students run their own blood work
- They also take their own radiographs
 - Owners help with most procedures

Education System

- School free for German citizens
- Five or six year program which includes undergraduate/preclinical studies
- Classes divided differently
- Higher drop out rate
- After done with classes need to find a mentor and work for 3 months before taking exams for graduation

with new friends
















